Mark Bankston was born on May 29, 1970 in Waxahachie, Texas. He is a 6th generation native Texan and an 11th generation New Sweden descendant along his direct paternal line. Through Y-DNA testing with Family Tree DNA and genealogy research, Mark established his relationship to his paternal ancestors Anders Bengtsson (1640-1705) and Gertrude Rambo (b. 1650), the eldest daughter of Peter Gunnarson Rambo (1612-1698) from Ramberget on Hisingen Island. Anders came to America from Gothenburg in 1656. The Duke of York's laws were in effect when Anders and Gertrude married, so Bengtsson became their family's surname. The English misspelled the name as Bankson, which evolved into Bankston among

grandchildren who left Philadelphia to move south. Mark's 3x great-grandparents James & Lavisa Bankston moved to the Republic of Texas in 1837. Since discovering his Swedish heritage, Mark has committed to learning about Sweden, its people, language, culture, history, food, and music. He believes the Swedish Club of Houston is a perfect way for him to further connect and learn more. Mark is a civil trial lawyer and lives in Sienna with his wife, Zyria ("Zee"), stepsons Austin and Vince, and their 3 huskies and 2 cats. He also plays lead guitar in a local rock band.

The first Fjällräven backpack—(pronounced "Fyall-RAAH-ven") is Swedish for "Arctic Fox". This backpack, made in Sweden in 1960, was created by Åke Nordin, a former soldier who began crafting wooden-framed backpacks with his mother's sewing machine in his family's cellar. Nordin lived in Örnsköldsvik, a coastal town 300 miles north of Stockholm. Nordin swapped the wooden parts for lighter and more durable aluminum, and after a while, design improvements resulted in frameless backpacks. His company began producing high-end winter jackets and other accessories.

Today, the company's sturdy backpacks can be spotted in downtown Amsterdam or on hiking trails in Zion National Park, a resurgence that's padding profits and fueling a solid stock market rally in Stockholm.

In 1977, Fjällräven's trajectory came changed as a study that Swedish children had an unusually high incidence of lower back pain due to book bags slung over their shoulders. After the study was released, Åke Nordin decided to adapt the backpacks so they could be used by students, spreading the weight evenly across the shoulders and leaving both hands free.

Since then, Fjällräven Kånken has remained almost unchanged since it was introduced just ahead of the 1978 school year. The first year, the company sold 400 backpacks; a year later the number jumped to 30,000.

CELEBRATING OUR LUCIA

FRIENDS OF LUCIA

The Swedish Club of Houston is soliciting donors to its Friends of Lucia fund in order to continue the tradition of sending our Lucia to Sweden.

The Swedish Club of Houston has been represented by its Lucia at the Texas Day celebration in Barkeryd, Sweden every year since 1988. The Lucia program has provided a wonderful way for the members involved to travel and learn about our Swedish ancestry and our Texas connection with Barkeryd; a complete list of the Swedish Club of Houston's Lucias is available at http://swedishclub.org/lucia.

Why is Barkeryd (a small parish near Nässjö in Småland) important to Texans? This small parish had half of its the population emigrate to Texas between 1836 and 1927! The conditions were bad and the opportunity of settling in America was given to the people of Barkeryd. Around 1867 many young people left Barkeryd; S.M. Swenson and Svante Palm paid for their passage to come to work for them in Texas, where workers were needed to help on the farms. The immigrants worked off their passage in about 2 years. After the debt was paid off they were free to live and work for themselves. There are many Swedish communities around Central Texas which were settled by the Barkeryd immigrants. In their honor, the people of Barkeryd Sweden were proclaimed honorary citizens of Texas on May 27, 1975 by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

MONA KRISTINA BERGMAN RASPLER 1937-2022

Mona passed away peacefully on February 7, 2022 in Thousand Oaks, CA.

She was born in Burträsk, Sweden, on September 22, 1937, and raised in Stockholm, Sweden. At age 13, Mona attended theatre school and began acting and modeling while also working in her mother's beauty salon. In her late teens, Mona spent time in Hamburg, Zurich, and London, working as a hair & fashion model. At 19, she was runner-up for Miss Sweden and was selected to represent Sweden in the Miss World pageant in London.

In 1961, Mona moved to New York City where she had a successful career as an international high-fashion model and actress, working in cities such as New York, London, Moscow, Toronto and Los Angeles.

Mona was featured in advertising campaigns for Clairol, Folgers, Sweet & Low and other national brands.

She acted in Broadway's "Boeing-Boeing" and on television shows such as Hullabaloo and The Les Crain Show. In New York, she studied film acting at Lee Strasberg Studio, jazz dance at Carnegie Hall, and theater at H.B. Studios. She was a member of the Screen Actors Guild, American Federation of Television & Radio Artists, and Stage Performers Guild.

In 1966, Mona married David Raspler on the roof of the St. Moritz hotel, overlooking Central Park.
They had two sons, Peter Erik Raspler and Adam lan Raspler, and Mona happily retired from
her modeling career to dedicate her time to her family.

In 1976, the family moved to Houston, Texas, where Mona was a founding member of SWEA Houston, President of The Swedish Club, and a member of the Swedish-American Chamber of Commerce. Additionally, she was active in The Woman's Fund, the Houston Motion Picture Academy, the Kinkaid School, American Field Service, Art & Artists Combine, the University Club, and the U.S. Tennis Association.

Mona enjoyed playing tennis, snow skiing, traveling, gardening, the arts and photography, but more than anything, she enjoyed spending time with her sons. She was an ever-loving and supportive mom, and she couldn't have been more proud of her boys.

In 2014, Mona moved to Thousand Oaks, CA, to be closer to her sons, who live in Los Angeles. She received excellent care in her final years at the University Village & Oakview senior living community.

Friends and family will lovingly remember Mona for her vibrancy, warmth, and energy.

She lit up the room with her beauty and engaging personality, and she shared enduring relationships with friends worldwide. She touched so many and will be greatly missed by all.

Mona is survived by her sons, Peter and Adam Raspler, and her extended family in the US and Sweden. She is preceded in death by her mother Britt Lundebergh, her step-father Nils Lundebergh, and her father Herbert Bergman.

The family will host a celebration of life gathering at a later date and time.
